



The French ports of Le Havre and Fos-sur-Mer will face more cargo disruption as worker unions call for another strike on May 26 and May 27, says a source from KWE France. The strikes continue in protest of the El Khomri law, recently passed by President François Hollande's administration in a bid to remediate country-wide unemployment.

Roadblocks impeding the ports will affect cargo transport, while the French government has assured that these blockades will be broken up. [Reuters reported](#) that workers from 19 of France's nuclear plants have also voted to go on strike on May 26, which may adversely affect power supply for the entire country.

Airport workers are also calling on a strike, and are purported to cut flight services by 15% at Paris-Orly airport, [says Connexion France](#). While there are currently no delays in the French airports, KWE sources warn that domestic flights may be delayed on the 26th.

Another three-day strike is planned to take course on June 2—several unions representing some 12,000 workers of France's Civil Aviation body may participate, which may result in hundreds of flights cancelled. The strike is to be confirmed on May 31 when union negotiators convene.

KWE France will continually update the KWE network on the situation.

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
